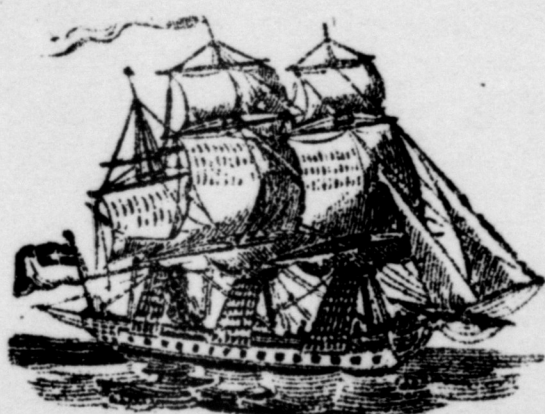

Arrival of the "ASIA."

HALIFAX, Nov. 13th, 1863.

Asia, from Liverpool Oct. 31st, Queenstown 1st Nov., arrived at Halifax on morning of 13th.

Asia experienced heavy head wind.

Severe storm had occurred around English coast : no shipping disaster yet reported. Iron-clad frigate *Prince Consort* from Plymouth for Liverpool, seriously disabled, and put into Kingston leaking.

A railway engine depot blown down in London, and three or four lives lost.

A new company is announced for developing freight steamers in American trade.

Privateer *Georgia* spoken recently in Bay of Biscay.

Board of Trade returns for September show increase in exports of 28 per cent over same month last year, and the figures thus far for the whole year indicate it will be a year of the greatest commercial prosperity that England has yet attained.

Danish reply to resolution of German Diet to send army of execution to Holstein had been read to Diet : it is conciliatory in form, but on material points maintains the views of the Danish Government.

Warsaw advices announce increase in arbitrary rule of Russians. Hundreds of young men have been arrested, searched, and stripped to the skin.

A letter by Prince Napoleon expresses wish that France will not allow Poland to be annihilated.

Out of 335 members chosen to Prussian Chambers 260 are Liberals.

London money and stock markets continued unsettled, but consuls were without material fluctuation.

Discount in rather more demand on 30th but rates unchanged.

LATEST.—Persia's news had little effect on markets.

Much surprise at removal of Rosecranz.

Confederate Privateer *Georgia* arrived at Cherbourg the 30th to revictual and coal.
