city, besides the thunder of artillery. The two rifle societies of the city, called Sebastian-union and William Tell-union, lined the road to the bridge over the Rhine. Right and left of the bridge lay badges adorned with flowers, and containing bands of music, which struck up the "National Anthem," while her Majesty passed the bridge, the barges all keeping pace with the carriage. The octri gate of the city had been transformed into a triumphal arch, bearing the arms of England, Scotland, and Ireland. An enormous crowd, which kept up the cheering, filled the streets of the town through which the carriage had to pass to reach the botel, called Breidenbacher-Hof.
