OUTRAGE AND MURDER IN CANADA BY AN AMERICAN Official. - Our readers will find in another column the details of a monstrous outrage committed in a Canadian port by a United States Marshal acting under a writ issued by an American Court. The particulars may be given in a few words :-- On Monday last, Marshal of the United States, named Tyler, accompained by several men in his service. crossed over from Port Huron, on the American side, to Port Edward, on the Canadian shore, for all cases. the purpose of serving a process issued by one of the law Courts in Michigan. The object of this intended service was a person named Jones, the skupper of a small brig named the Concord.
