PRINCE OF WALES AT NIAGARA FALLS.

We extract the following from the Quebec Chronicle relative to the movements of the Prince of Wales at Niagara Falls.

The illumination of the Falls last night was superb. The great Gulf, horribly dark a minute before, became clearly visible in all its features, as soon as the long line of fires was lighted, which extended near the water's edge, all the cliff on the Canada side.

The Prince of Wales' visit is to cost the Canadians a princely sum—\$1,000,000. A bronze statue to the Arctic hero, Sir John Franklin, is about to be erected at Spilsby, Lincolnshire, the place of his birth.

It is announced in the English papers that the Great Eastern will sail from Milford Haven for New York on Wednesday, Oct. 17.

ARRIVAL OF THE EUROPA.

The steamer Europa, from Liverpool, with dates to the 8th inst., arrived at Halifax on the morning of the 19th.

The condition of the crops in the United Kingdom are more favorable than could have been expected a few weeks since.

Trade was improving. A telegram from London on the evening of the 7th says: "Although the weather is very fine, the funds today are dull at yesterday's quotations, and barely supported."

A frightful destruction of life had occurred at Heliopolis, on the East Lancashire section of the London and Yorkshire railway, some eighteen or twenty miles from Manchester, by which ten lives have been sacrificed, and it is stated that no less than twenty-two legs were broken—a number which the medical men declare to be unprecedented.

IRELAND.—The Weather and the Crops.—The Dublin journals term with the most gloomy accounts of the weather in various parts of the country, there having been very heavy rains for some days past.

There is to be a fusion of Presbyterian bodies in Nova Scotia, on the 4th of October. On the following day the 300th anniversary of the Reformation in Scotland will be celebrated.

In Richmond, Virginia, a congregation calling themselves "Independent American Catholics" has been organized, which repudiates and protests against the Roman hierarchy in every form.

The Mussulmans of Herzegovina have been treating themselves to a massacre of Christians, including women and children. That Turkish province lies very convenient to be taken by the Austrians, to whom Europe may hand it over, if these outrages are not ended, and their perpetrators hanged.

An invitation has been forwarded to Miss Harriet Lane, President Buchanan's niece, to open the ball with the Prince of Wales at the New York Academy of Music.

The weekly statement of the Emigration Commissioners of New York shows that 74,991 emigrants arrived at that port since the 1st of January last.

Two centuries ago not one person in a hundred wore stockings. The Illinois Central Railroad is furnished with seventeen miles of cars, with the usual proportion of freight cars; but the grain crops of the state are so enormous, the road is incapable of doing all the transportation required of it.

THE ORANGE RESOLUTIONS.

The Orangemen of Toronto and District met on Tuesday morning, 11th, in their Hall. The following among other resolutions, were passed unanimously: "That thousands of the Protestant inhabitants of this city and district, justly alarmed at the claims frequently advanced and too often conceded to the members of the Church of Rome, have endeavored to form a purely defensive association, and that while they distinctly disavow all aggressive intentions, designs, and purposes, secret or open, they emphatically declare that their objects are strictly loyal, patriotic and Protestant, without meaning insult or offence to any, acting only in the defence of religious liberty, civil equality, or the unity of the Empire, and the purity of its constitution may be questioned."

Are we apostles for Orangemen? While their Institution is based upon the principle "Fear God, honor the King, have charity toward all men," while the sustaining of the Protestant Constitution upon the principles of the Protestant faith and Bible is its highest aim, it seems to us no Protestant should be ashamed at being heard as the defender of the Institution.
