

LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE AFRICA.

New York, March 8.

The Africa arrived yesterday.

This budget and commercial treaty with France are the main topics of discussion in England. Both met with opposition from Conservatives.

The House negatived the motion to abolish flogging in the navy.

Lord John Russell would introduce reform Bill on 1st March.

FURTHER FROM THE HUNGARIAN.—The Halifax papers of last Wednesday publish the following dispatch received by the agent of the Associated Press, Otto Barriault:

"I have made diligent enquiry, but cannot ascertain who found the clearance; it is generally believed the report is unfounded. I have seen the Shipping papers, and nothing giving the number of passengers. Only two bodies found. A number of letters in my possession; some much defaced. The agent is here from Montreal."

LATEST FROM THE HUNGARIAN.—Halifax, March 2.—An official letter from Mr. Townsend, the Government agent, at the wreck, says that he now ascertains, beyond a doubt, that there are no survivors. Of the three bodies have been found—one woman, one man, supposed to be a woman, and one child, two years old.

The cargo and materials are scattered along the shore, from Tusket round Cape Sable, as far as St. John's Bay Islands. Considerable goods are drifting ashore at the mouth of Shelbourne harbor. The country people generally are acting honestly; three or four hundred men hired to collect the floating property. A considerable amount in value will be collected. The ship's articles have been found, showing seventy-four of the crew. No passenger list discovered, as it is rumored the finding of the clearance was untrue.

The only passengers yet known are William Boultonhouse, of Sackville, and Doctor Barry, of New York. Bodies were found, containing a number of letters to his wife and daughter.

Particular care will be taken of any bodies found, marks will be kept, and the bodies buried in separate graves, for recovery by friends.

The Mills have been soaked into pulp, but will be sent to Halifax by the Cutter.

THE HUNGARIAN.—STARTLING INFORMATION.—There can be little doubt that the cause of her loss was a sudden in navigation, very probably having its origin in local magnetic attraction, which affected her compass. At the circumstances attending the loss of the Indian still fresh in his mind, there is reason to suppose that Capt. Jones considered the vessel had struck the land at the time she went westward. When we suppose that many of the local attraction was the probable cause of her loss, we are strengthened in this conviction by finding a correspondence between some of the captains of this line and R. B. Forbes—Capt. Forbes, whose interest in all that concerns the sea is compendious, called the attention of Capt. Jones to the fact of this line to the important fact that Capt. Morris discovered a process by which attraction on board of iron vessels could be completely neutralized, so that the compass should be left free to the action of proper attraction alone. The answers which he received were courteous, but discredited his claims. In fact, none of them stated that it was possible, and him self well after getting information that companies were in the way of taking up on board of any of those vessels in the vicinity of the land,—that they were navigated almost by guess-work.

To what other cause, therefore, than deranged compasses can the loss of these vessels be attributed? They were all in perfect order up to the time they sailed, and the fact that they were lost affords strong reason to disprove that the condition of the Hungarian was different from that of her predecessors in misfortune; but, on the contrary, taking into consideration the time of her passage, it is not unreasonable to infer that she also was in great danger when she struck. Whether the owners of the line might have been apprised of the matter, remains open until the important subject we are not informed, but even from the time of the answer received it was evident to our mind that the captains themselves were unwilling to avail themselves of the information so discreetly given them.—Boston Commercial Bulletin.
