

Paris returns to Naples without visiting London, under the conviction that his mission would be useless. The Pope's conference at Baden was attracting attention. The Prince Regent of Prussia arrived there on the 14th, and Napoleon on the next day. It was reported that the kings of Saxony, Hanover, Bavaria, Wurtemberg, and other German Princes, will join the Conference. There are various speculations as to the cause and effect of the meeting but nothing authentic.

English Parliamentary proceedings unimportant. The explanation given in both Houses of the outbreak in New Zealand, are confirmatory of newspaper accounts. It was reported that the 12 millions sterling recommended for the fortifications by the defense commissioners, will be raised by means of annuities, terminable in 25 years, and that the works will be forthwith commenced. G. P. R. James, the novelist, is dead. John Foster & Co., private bankers, Bilton, suspended—liabilities moderate.

The annexation of Savoy and Nice was formally consummated on the 14th. The event was celebrated by a Te Deum, grand review, &c., at Paris. M. Thiers was decorated with the Grand Cordón of Legion of Honor on the occasion. The monthly returns of the Bank of France show an increase of cash over 19,000,000 francs. Prince de Monaco, released, caused great uneasiness. A loan of 100,000,000 francs, for a new loan of one hundred and fifty million francs. Marshal Valant was visiting Victor Emmanuel, &c., for France. The Austrian Cabinet had unanimously re-established the Ministry of Commerce and Public Works.

A new Russian loan of eight millions sterling at four and a half per cent., expected to be introduced to London by Baring.

The contributions to the Prince's reception fund at Montreal has already reached the sum of \$15,690.
