For working horses the use of this pernicious strap is especially cruel. The horse, in endeavoring to put forth his strength, needs the free natural use of his head and neck." And anything which cramps and restrains him is both eruel to the animal, and makes him less serviceable to his owner .- American Agriculturist.
