RAILROADS .- The first railroad in the United States was at Quincy, Mass., about three miles long, connecting the granite quarries with tide water. The Baltimore and Ohio, the first passen ger railroad, was opened for 15 miles in 1820, with horse power. The Mohawk and Hudson, from Albany to Schenectady, 16 miles, was opened with horse power in 1831. The first locomotive used in this country was on that road in 1831. The whole amount of capital and loans authorized to be invested in railways in England, up to 1859, was \$1,963,413,775, which had all been raised and \$1, 489,001.040 expended since 1828. There have been 9,266 miles of railway built in Gteat Britain / Ul and Ireland. The weekly average receipts from passengers and merchandise were \$2,450,000. The gross receipts of the eight railways terminating in London are over a million of dollars a week. Besides the money invested in British railways, a great deal of stock in railways all over the world is in English hands.

No fewer than twenty-six members of the British peerage died during last year; to these must be added twenty-two baronets, twenty-two knights and four members of the House of Commons. Two European sovereigns died-the Kings of Naples and Sweeden. The ancient Metternich has disappeared from Austria, and the learned Humboldt from Prussia.
