The joiny daily papers are resolved that the man, convicted of the murder, by poison, of Isabella Banks . wall not die by the hands of the hangman. The bigipriced journals, though admitting some correspondence in favor of the remission of the sentence. have not displayed any zeal for the saving of the life of the condemned. It seems likely, therefore, that but for the Star and the Telegraph the amount of public feeling now displayed would not have been witnessed, and that the execution would have taken place as a matter of course. The opposition, however, that has been aroused, will in all probability prevent this. The gross partiality of the judge is all but universally condemned; and the belief is general, that although the circumstantial evidence against the prisoner was strong, the incdical evidence, which was chiefly relied upon, was so dete :tive as to be utterly worthfess. The conviction. moreover, is evidently growing that the woman did not die of poison, but from natural causes. Hence numerously signed memorials have been presented to the Home Secretary-Sir G. C. Lewis and at several large public meetings resolutions have been unanimously adopted against the strangling of the alleged criminal. Smethurst himself-has written a long communication to the Minister of State, in which he vehemently asserts his entire innocence of the atrocity for which he has been condemnel, and his counsel have had a long interview with the Under Secretary, when they stated their reasons for objecting to the verdict, in point of law and in point of fact.
