

## Heraldry.

The London Times Office.—One of the most interesting and novel departments is that in which the heraldic, or, as it is called, the "Heraldic," is printed from stereotype plates thus saving a great part of the wear and tear of the type. The entire type plate is taken from the "Heraldic" in three minutes, by a new process, invented by a Swiss, and known only to him. A thin layer of soft and damp paper is first pressed upon the type, and then, after it has been hardened by the action of heat, the melted lead is poured on which is to form the stereotype plate. The paper is then the power of retaining the action of the melted lead, and comes out of the fiery trial unimpaired, and almost unaltered. The plates are re-used every day after the issue of the day is printed, and the waste of type material from day to day is very slight. By this power of multiplying the number of forms from which the same side of the paper can be printed, the Times can use three or four presses at once, and thus print its 50,000 copies on an emergency, in two hours time. The Times employs in its establishment some 350 persons, has eighteen reporters at the house of Parliament, and for these, as well as the majority of its correspondents, the working hours are the night hours exclusively. It owns four cars, which are employed solely in carrying reporters and reports at night and from between Parliament Square and the Palace at Westminster. The reporters ride each other at the house every quarter hour, and thus, though the debate in the Commons lasts till four o'clock in the morning, the Times gives it in full by sunrise, though it covers two whole pages of the journal.

**SLEEP OF PLANTS.**—Plants sleep as well as animals; the attitude that some of these assume on the approach of night is extremely interesting to those who delight to study the beautiful phenomena of vegetable life. Some plants exhibit signs of sleep more marked than others. The leaves of clover, locowe, and other plants, close as the sun approaches the horizon, and in the morning they open again. The characteristic is particularly striking in the case of the Mimosa pudica, which is so named because of its habit of closing its leaves at night, and when the sleeping attitude is completed these folded leaves embrace in their upper surface the rudiments of the young shoots; and the uppermost pair (but one) at the end of the stalk are furnished with long leaved stalks that they can close upon the terminating pair and protect the end of the shoot.—*Scientific American.*

**A MILLION BUFFALOES.**—Horace Greeley writing from the plains, makes the following estimate of the number of buffaloes: "What strikes the stranger with the most amazement is their immense numbers. I know a million is a great many, but I am confident we saw that number yesterday. Certainly all we saw could not have stood on ten square miles of ground. Often the country on either hand seemed to be black with them. The soil is rich and well matted with their favorite grass. Yet it is, except a very little on the creek bottoms, near the timber, eaten down like an overtasked steed pastured in a dry August. Certainly the whole travelled more than one hundred miles in width since we first struck them, and that they continue for some 25 miles further on, this being the breadth of their present range, which has a length of perhaps a thousand miles, and you have some approach to an idea of their countless millions. I doubt whether the domesticated herds of cattle of the United States equal the numbers, while they must fall considerably short in weight of these wild ones."

**DOMESTIC LIFE.**—He cannot be an unhappy man who has the love and smile of woman to accompany him in every department of his life. The world may look dark and cheerless without woman, but in her path—but when he returns to the fireside, and feels the tender love of woman, he forgets his cares and troubles, and is a comparatively happy man. He is but half prepared for the journey of life who takes not with him that friend who will make him his life. The man who will divide his sorrows, increase his joys, lift the veil from his heart, and throw sunshine amid the darkest scenes, no man cannot be miserable who has such a companion, be he ever so poor, despised, and trodden upon by the world.

**A BEAUTIFUL FAIRY.**—Beautiful exceedingly is the burial of children among the Mexicans. No dark procession or gloomy looks mark the passage to the grave; but dressed in his holiday attire, and garlanded with bright, fresh flowers, the little sleeper is borne to his rest. Glad songs, and joyful bells are rung, and, lightly as to a festival, the gay group goes its way. The child is not dead, they say, but "going home." The Mexican mother, who has household treasures laid away in the campo santo (God's sacred field), breathes a sweet faith, only heard elsewhere in the poet's utterance. Ask her how many children bless her house, and she will answer: "Five; two here, and three yonder." So, despite death and the grave, it is yet an unbroken household, and the simple mother ever lives in the thought.

**A FASHION WORTH IMITATING.**—The latest "fashion" announced from Europe is that of dressing very plainly when going to church. Some of the ladies of the "first circles" go up to worship in the plain calico. It is thus sought to encourage the attendance of the very poor, who have hitherto withheld their presence for lack of Sunday clothes.—*Boston Journal.*

**We should like to see this fashion introduced into this country.** The custom of making a display of costly clothing and jewelry in the house of God is entirely inconsistent with the object of worship, and undoubtedly prevents many of the poor from attending church. Clothes neat and plain are best fitted for Sunday wear.—*Portland Transcript.*
