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

COLORS OF FLOWERS PROMOTED BY CHARCOAL .-A French amateur, in the Paris Horticultural Review, states: "About a year ago I made a bargain for a rose bush of magnificent growth, and full of buds. I waited for them to bloom, and expected Aug. 1 roses wort'y of such a noble plant, and of the praise bestowed upon it by the vender. At length, when it blossomed, all my hopes were blasted. The flowers were of a faded color, and I discovered that I had only a middling multiflora, stale colored enough .-I therefore resolved to sacrifice it to some experiment | Sept. 26. I had in view. My attention had been captivated with the effects of charcoal, as stated in some Enalish publications. I then covered the earth (in the pot in which my rose bush was) about half an inch deep with pulverized charcoal. Some days after I Oct. 29. was astonished to see the roses which bloomed of as fine and lively rose color as I could wish. I determined to repeat the experiment; and, therefore when the rose bush had done flowering, I took off charcoal and put fresh earth on the pot. You may concieve that I waited for the next Spring impatiently, to see the result of this experiment. When Nov. 7. it bloomed the roses were at first pale and discolored; but by applying the charcoal as before, they soon resumed their rosy-red color. I tried the powdered charcoal likewise in large quantities upon my petunias, and found that both the white and violet flowers were equally sensible to its action. It all ways gave great vigor to the red or violet colors of the flowers, and the white petunias became veined Dec. 6. with red or violet tints. The violets (colors) became colored with irregular spots of a blueish or almost black tint. Many persons who admired them thought they were new varieties from seed.
