THE ISLAND OF CEYLON.

AND ITS WONDERS. Since the Bishop Heber wrote that beautiful hymn in which occurs the well known lines-"What though the spicy breezes

Blow soft from Ceylou's Isle," the world has almost lost sight of one of the oldest. most mysterious and fertile kingdoms of the earth. The poulation of all races in Ceylon amounted in 1856 to 1, 695,974, besides soldiers and aliens estimated at about 30,000; yet the Island is only about one sixth smaller than Ireland. Five centur-1es before Christ, civilization was established in this island, and the population was ten times as great as it is now. It is inhabited by races whose origin is lost in primitive antiquity; traces of the demon worship of fattened scrpents still linger among the superstitions of the people, and the lofty pinnacle called "Adam's Peak," which has served for ages as a landmark to the navigators of the Eastern seas, is said still to bear the footprints of the first created man. Many centuries ago, irrigation by artificial lakes and enormous tanks, one of which was forty miles in circumference, gave life and fertility to the soil, and as the modern traveller penetrates by forgotten tracks into the recess of the forest, he is everywhere struck by the vast and countless excavations and embankments which attest the ingenuity and industry of a great people.

Ceylon has been successively occupied and ruled by the Portuguese and by the Dutch, until at length it passed entirely into the possession of the British Crown. Two thousand years ago the Budhist faith was introduced into the Island, and it soon became one of the chief seats of that creed -The mystical Bo-tree, which still flourishes in the holy precincts of Anarajapoora, detached from the identical tree under which Buddha reclined when he received his initiation in Urwela, has already completed its second millenium. Apart from its heary and mysterious antiquity, the Island derives a peculiar and romantic interest from, its incomparable natural beauty and its varied natural productions. Peafowls run wild in the woods of Ceylon, and the crows there are more mischevious and intelligent than anywhere else. Monkeys, "gem-like sun birds," enamelled dragon flies, bronze winged pigcons, hawks, falcons, golden beetles, cranes paro quets, jungle-cocks, leopards, elephants, orioles, and "dancing clouds of gaudy butterflies," combine to make the landscapes of Ceylon a succession of wonderful and exciting panoramie pictures. In the forest there are musical trees that recall the perial music of Prospero, and even the lakes are rendered melodious by the thrills and musical chords of a species of shell fish. "Travelling fishes," "climbing fishes," "burying fishes," and "hot water fishes," are also described-and their existence well attested. We find-curious facts !-that during the intolerably hot and dry season, there is a summer hybernation, if we may so express it, of the Ceylonese animals in cold climates. We are treated to a picture of the landleech, a ferocious little creature that attacks both man and beast at every chance and without the slightest provocation. Lastty we discover that they have "mad stones' in Ceylon, and that they are nothing more than " pieces of charred bone" that have a rapidly absorbing power when applied to the recent bite of a cobra or other poisonous snake.
