An English scientific paper says, that instead of the public generally that he has rivetting sheets of iron together, (the plan now in general use to make boilers,) a new process has been successfully applied by uniting the shheetsand slabs of iron together in one complete mass by welding. A boiler upon this principle has been made in Woolwich dock yard without a single seam or rivet, and is of cylindrical shape, 4 feet in diameter, 8 feet long, with an internal tube 2 feet 2 inches in diameter, and bell mouthed at the front, increasing to a D form, 3 feet 6 inches at the fire box, from which small tubes of 13 inches diameter proceed to the end of the boiler. The whole has been severely tested and proved to 180 lbs on the square inch. The form of the boiler was selected as a test of the possibility of accomplishing the process, which appears to be now no longer disputable, and which it is stated is equally applicable in the construction of heavy ordinance.
