Facts about Woodstock.

The town of Woodstock contains to-day over 2,-000 inhabitants, being an increase in five years of 500; 219 dwelling houses, 238 stores and barns, and there are 12 houses building: the number of aeres of land in the town are 1080; unimproved 580 acres; the value of the land is put down at \$38,young cattle. Last year there were raised here 300 tons of hay, 135 bushels of wheat, 1000 bushels of eats, 1000 bushels of buckwheat, 1100 bushels of potatoes, besides Indian corn, &c.
