PROVINCIAL SECRETARY explained. It was estimated, last year, that £12,500 would be required, from the general revenues, to meet the deficiency, of interest, on Railways. Instead of that amount, it had been necessary to draw only, £3379 5s 11d, and deducting from this amount, the sum of the earnings of the last fiscal year, remaining in the hands of the Commissioners, on the 1st Nov., amounting to £2,496, it reduced the amount to £882 18s 11d or, in other words, taking the balance of the Railway Impost found on hand at the close of the fiscal year, 1859, added to the Impost fund, of 1860, together with the net earnings of the Railway, up to Nov. 1st 1860, gave a sum sufficient to meet the interest, paid upon our Railway expenditure, for the last fiscal year, less £882 18s 11d, instead of £12,500 as estimated last year.

MR. WILMOT would be agreably disappointed should the Secretary's figures prove correct, of which he must express his doubts, until he had convinced himself by an inspection of the accounts.
