3. The life, spirit and interest of the farmers' club is conversation. Plain, farmer-like talk is what is wanted. Give each member a chance to tell his own story in his own way-with the privilege of having questions asked him as they occur to other members during the statements being made. This will, in fact, be a meeting for conversation, a true "conversational farmers' club."

4. A library is an indispensable part of every well organized society. This can be composed of agricultural journals, transactions of agricultural societies, with standard works upon the various topics of farm and rural affairs. A small fund, with some donations of books from societ ies and individual members would at once establish the library, and it would be found a valuable means of disseminating the right kind of information.

5. Having drawn out of items to "fifthly," we will now draw to a close. Need I would call particular attention to the Leviathan Elewe urge upon our readers, at this exact time, the establishment of these clubs? Let three or four neighbors, practical farmers and desirous of improvement, agree to meet once a week at the houses of each other in turn. Select some subject upon which to talk, appoint one of your number to read half an hour or so, from some standard author, which may suggest several topics for conversation, eat a few apples, visit your host's barns, view his stock &c., and the thing is accomplished. You will soon love to meet and talk of matters pertaining to your profession, and you will by this means not only have an interest in each other's success, but an honorable spirit of rivalry will begin to awaken you to new performances and greater activity.—Maine Farmer.

Bring to a boil and put in one-tourth of a teacup of muriate of tin, and a table-spoonful of cream of Tartar .-Boil and stir well for five minutes and enter goods, boil or simmer for twenty or thirty minutes. Hickory bark will do, but is not as good as black or yellow oak, (quercitron of commerce.)
