FLORESCVILLE, JULY 24, 1861. Mr. Editor, Sir,—Please insert the following scheme in your paper for three months.

Hitherto we have always expected our representatives to do some great thing or other for us, without our fairly showing what was wanted. Now I propose something for them to do, and something for the people to require carried out.

Scheme to build two or more Bridges across the Saint John River, one at Florenceville, and the other at Woodstock, to form connections with the thoroughfares through the United States. This scheme will not increase our taxes, will not diminish the revenue, but on the contrary, will do us good in many ways. It will open up and connect this side to the great farming country east of us; increase our population four hundred families to a bridge, and open the way by the expenditure of twenty thousand pounds, and proceed to each bridge to the introduction of thousands into the country.

Applied to one Bridge at Florenceville, let Government grant 40,000 acres of land in two blocks, called Peel and Florenceville Bridge Grants, let it be farming land, and chosen on the east side of the river, opposite here, for the purpose of raising a fund out of, to build the bridge, and afterwards paying of the debt and interest in twenty years or twenty thousand pounds, and proceed to each bridge to the introduction of thousands into the country.

Let the Government, after granting the land, either by the Board of Works, or otherwise, give the land in security to English Capitalists, subject to certain management, viz. the immediate settlement of it and sale to the Government at 3s. per acre, more or less, for the payment of the debt in 20 years, and let the Government pay the interest on 20,000 yearly, which at 5 per cent, will be £1,000, and take instead the addition to our revenue, one hundred families and their increase will make—any one who gives the thing a thought, will understand that at 3s. per acre, 40,000 acres will amount to £120,000, and as a sinking fund, with interest payable annually, left in the hands of the settlers, or otherwise placed to compound at simple interest, will in 20 years (more or less) pay off the debt. Any one will understand that in 20 years, 40,000 acres of cultivated land, with broad fields, Jackstraw, corn, &c., will be a magnificent realization; any one will understand that the busy heads and hands of 400 families, and their increase, producing and consuming, must replace fourfold the yearly interest. There are elements of the country, and the advancement of the present time; and the feasibility of this scheme is more fully proved out of into by the large emigration on lands adjoining where we were settled, viz. Glassville, Knowlville, &c., by a class of people respectable, and possessing considerable means. And now is the time to stimulate such emigration; the true way to get able hands into the country, is to get the people, and cultivate the soil. Let no sectional feelings, or jealousy, prevent the building of these bridges; the same principle applied will build bridges at whatever point required on the river, and in any case will understand that in 20 years, 40,000 acres of cultivated land, with broad fields, Jackstraw, corn, &c., will be a magnificent realization; any one will understand that the busy heads and hands of 400 families, and their increase, producing and consuming, must replace fourfold the yearly interest.
