A RAILROAD TRAIN OVERTAKEN BY A FLOOD .- The Passengers Nearly Starved to Death .- The New Orleans papers of the 4th and 5th inst., come to us filled with accounts of a " blow' on the Gulf, which caused a flood along the Jackson Railroad. The Picayune of the 5th contains a detailed account of the suffering of 150 passengers on that Railroad, who were detained three days by the storm:

"We were then at Bayou Desert, within 150 yards of the Lake shore, and could see the waves rolling in from the Lake. The water around us was about seven feet deep and covered with large logs, which were driven by the waves with such force against the track as to break and wash it off all around us. The water was nearly up to the bottom of the cars, and large logs, two feet in diameter, were forced in between the cars and the track. We portion of the track on which we stood.

"In this dreadful position we remained, contemplating a scene of most awful grandeur. Above and around us the tempest roared with ceaseless fury. to her relief, an old negro woman, nearly 70 years a long walk. old, floating on the top of a hay stack. She disap-

The whole forenoon had passed; it was now past 1 o'clock, p. m., and we had nothing to eat since the day before, at dinner. One gentleman among us had the good fortune to have a basket of provisions with him. He was travelling with four orphan children under his care, and the provisions were for their use; this he generously dividided amongst all—the ladies and children being as the shadows of the night before the rising sun. of course, first provided with the scanty ration."

The passengers remained in that "fix" for three days, during which they nearly starved to death .-The subsidence of the waters finally allowed them to get to New Orleans.
