We admire the principle of free discussion: We rejoice to have every matter of public interest so sed to find fault with hon. members who from principle, from conscientious views, exercises the constitutional right to delay by discussion too heaty action; but we must condemn the exhibition of ob-Blinate, determined, unreasonable and dogged resistance to the smooth and correct current of legislation from spite, a desire for revenge or for place; such we have witnessed during the week and such we reprobate; nor shall personal likings or private feelings induce us to abate one jot our firm belief, the item passed. that in politics as in other matters there should be honesty and high minded principle. We should be recreant to every claim which society has upon us as a public journalist were we to do otherwise, or did we not warn our readers against being deluded by clap trap or led away from truth, by specialities of professed politicians, who have never yet from their long experience learned that honest; wholesale truth is after all the best and surest policy. We lay this down as a general principle let those whom it effects feel it, let those for whose advice and gui-

ply the rule as the test of their sincerity.

SUPPLY-PERSONAL QUARRELL. Last week we mentioned that the first two items of supply had been passed; the next in order was the Post Office vote. His Hon, the Speaker opened the discussion on this item, he felt called upon to make some statements because the other day, when he was in the chair, and, consequently in a position not to defend himself the statement had been made by the ex P. M. G, Mr. Connell, that when he (Mr. C.) came to the office he found the department in a state of utter disorder—that was a direct reflection upon himself (the Speaker) as he had been Mr. C's. immediate predecessor. He denied the statement, as he had done to Mr. C's. teeth in stronger terms elsewhere. (We may here remark that the Speaker the day before, meeting Mr. Connell in one of the coaches, without any preliminaries told Mr. Connell he was a liar, and upon Mr. C's. stating that he could prove the original statement correct by facts and figures, intimated that he was prepared to give Mr. C. Tiets and figures then and there. meaning we suppose, knuckles and knocks. Mr. Connell not being a fighting man did not make the retort which under the circumstances would have been best suited to the manner of the Speaker, which was, we must say, derogatory to his dignity and to that of the House, every member of which should at all events by the first commoner, be supposed gentlemen). The Speaker then proceeded to castigate Mr. Connell with his tongue, referring to upon, his style of speaking : his personal appearance, his physiology, his face upon the stamps usurping the place of the Queen's likeness. He compared him to a diver duck upon whose appearance you could never depend upon with certainty, you saw it go down but could not tell when it would arise. He charged Mr. Connell with plagiarism in having embodied in his last report, without credit, the post office regulations and directory which had been compiled by him, (the Speaker) and his predecessor Mr. M'Phelim. He said Mr. Connell bad without provision of law and to great mjury of private interest instituted the system of prepayment on English letters mentioning an instance where, in consequence, a letter of importance had been returned and delayed. He spoke of a lot of old blanks and papers which had been sold to the paper factory, St. John, and the return for which he could not find included in the accounts. There was a deficiency against the late head clerk Mr. Hutchinson, which had been made appear as occurring when he (the Speaker) was in the department, but had not been brought into his successors account. The Speaker explained that according to Mr. Hatchinsons shewing, the deficiency arose from Mr. II. using money of the department in his hands, (which money was allowed so to remain because the Central Bank was not at that time in working order,) anticipating an increase of salary promised him, which increase was not made. Mr. Connell had subsidized the press of the province to puff him, by an unnecessary amount of advertising, and referred to the fact that he had visited Canada and the United States, And added largely to the items of travelling expenses, and had booked himself at the hotels as The Post Master General of New Branswick. He likewise alluded to the fact that a large portion of the increase in Way Offices was in Carleton County.
