**THE CREW OF THE PERSIA.**—The gang of men, 30 in number, being part of the crew of the Persia, who were engaged in landing the troops in the St. Lawrence, and who were abandoned with their hats have since arrived safe in Boston, and proceeded home in the Niagara to Liverpool. Six of the party went to New York, and will perform duty on the steamer Asia, by which they will return. The six boats of the Persia engaged in the transportation of the troops were all destroyed, and the wrecks were left in the ice. The N. Y. Tribune says—Many fears were entertained for the safety of those left behind, but the men who arrived here state that they left them all in good health, excepting one, who was frost bitten. He was sent to the hospital. The men travelled in sleighs to Boston.—*H. Colston.*

**A STEAM SLOOP.**—The Plymouth England Mail states that steel steam-sloop, constructed only to draw 6 feet of water, has been built by the Steven Steam Navigation Company. She has a moveable keel like several of the American coasting sloops. She is about 120 feet long, and registered 91 tons, is supplied with engines of 40 horse power can stow about 122 tons of coal, and usually expends about 50 cwt. in 24 hours.
