

**ANOTHER FEARFUL COLLIERIES ACCIDENT.**—Loss of Fifty Lives.—An awful explosion occurred on Wednesday, the 19th, at about 12 o'clock, at the Colliery in Coal Pit, Merthyr Tydfil, by which fifty lives have been sacrificed.

Cethin, or Cethin pit, the property of Mr. Crawley, the extensive iron master of Cyfartha, is the largest in the district, employing upwards of 200 men, and is about equidistant between Merthyr, Tydfil and Troedyrhi.

At noon on Wednesday, the over-looker at the pit's mouth had noticed that something unusual had occurred in the pit, which was soon followed by information that an explosion of gas had taken place. Means were at once adopted to render assistance and to ascertain the extent of the calamity, which, unfortunately, has proved to be the most dreadful that ever happened in that valley. Up to Thursday morning 44 persons were brought up dead, and three alive, but so severely burnt that one has since expired, and the other two are not expected to survive. About half of the number were severely burnt, but the rest had not a hair singed, having been suffocated by the choke damp.

ENGLAND'S PROSPERITY NOT DEPENDENT ON AMERICA.—A London correspondent of the New York Commercial Advertiser has the following remarks on this subject:

"One deplorable influence against the preservation of good relations between us consists in the utter ignorance of some of our leading journals regarding the actual position of England. Take for instance the statement that without the usual supply of American breadstuffs England would find her millions in a state of starvation, that her Government would become bankrupt, and that a revolution would ensue. All these predictions appear in the latest columns of your chief morning papers, and have been reproduced here, to the incalculable damage of the reputation of your people for the possession even of ordinary intelligence.

"England depends not naturally on account of its inevitable losses, even under the best circumstances, and there is no occasion to set up any fetish to account for her desire to submit to anything short of absolute dishonor, in order to avoid it. As to the supply of breadstuffs, every reader must be well aware that the question even in ordinary times is simply one of a few cents per bushel between America and Russia. The latter power even at this moment is calculating her prospective gain at the prospect of a rupture which may extinguish the rivalry she experiences from your Western farmers. Again, as to bankruptcy, the case with which England went through the Crimean war, which at its close found her stronger, more respected, than she had been previously, dispirited the delusion over, ought to have been more repeated than any other, that she could never more venture upon any very enormous expenditure.

"Lastly, with regard to the revolution, it may be stated with literal exactitude that there never was a country so united in its political sentiments as England is at this day. Out of the daily London papers the aggregate circulation may be estimated at two hundred and fifty thousand, there is only one exception, and this has the smallest circulation of the whole, probably not more than fifteen thousand and is kept up by its promoters at a personal pecuniary sacrifice. In the provincial press the unanimity may be said to be still more perfect. One of the most intelligent and prominent men now in London recently expressed the fact that the point which had attracted his notice more than any other was the entire harmony of view which prevailed among all classes. The Confederates have suffered enough from the wickedness and folly that encouraged the idea that Europe must help them, or perish from want of cotton, and it would be sad to find the North galled on a worse mistake.

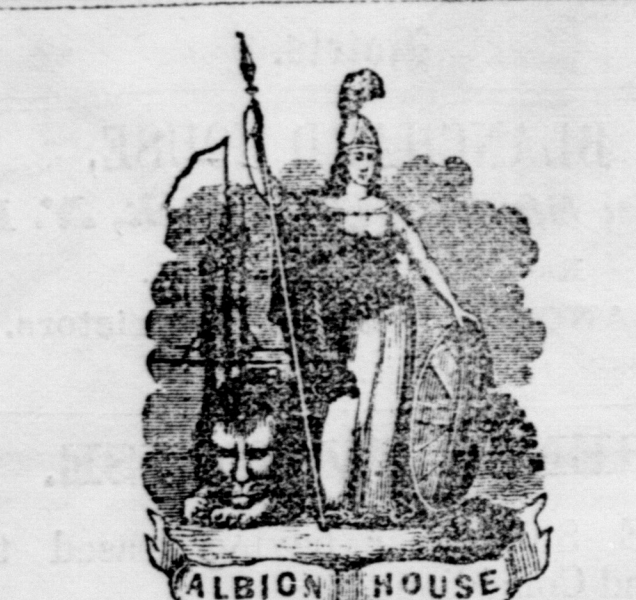

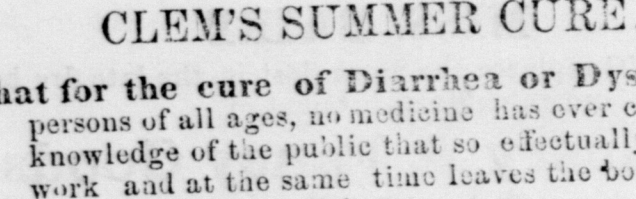
