

ITALY.—Signor Cordova tendered his resignation. The Minister of Justice, Signor Paggi, succeeded him.

The Opinions of Turin believe that the ministerial programme will contain a project for putting into activity the mobile National Guard.

GREECE.—The insurrection in Nauplia, it is said, has already cost 5000 lives.

INDIA.—The Bombay mail of 15th Feb. arrived and was forwarded per American. News generally anticipated. News of the settlement of American dispute gave great satisfaction in India. Great excitement in cotton market.

Latest via Queenstown.—BERLIN, 8th.—Ministry resigned to day in consequence of the adoption in the Lower House of the motion that the principal items of Revenue and Expenditure be included in the general budget.

FRANKFORT, 8th.—In Federal Diet to day, Austria and Prussia proposed the re-establishment of the Constitution of 1831, in Electoral House, in conformity with Federal Laws, with the provisional rights of States to be respected.

PARIS, 9th.—Ministry says that the statement that students of the Polytechnic School were confined to the building in consequence of agitation in the Quartier Latin, was incorrect.

TURIN, 9th.—Italy says conference between Garibaldi and Rattazzi has had very important results, of a nature to exercise great influence over destinies of the country. The Italian Villanova is spoken of as Minister of Foreign Affairs.

MADRID, 8th.—Madrid Journals assert that the news that Government contemplates recalling Gen. Prim is correct.

Several Spanish Prelates will attend the approaching Consecration at Rome.

Australian gold to the value of three hundred and eighteen thousand pounds sterling had arrived. A million additional was still known to be at sea. Total specie arrivals of the week reached nearly a million and a quarter sterling.

Cotton dull and still declining. Breadstuffs still declining. Flour easier, 27s. to 30s. Wheat quiet and steady, at 47s. Consols 93 to 93½. Bullion in Bank decreased 475,000.

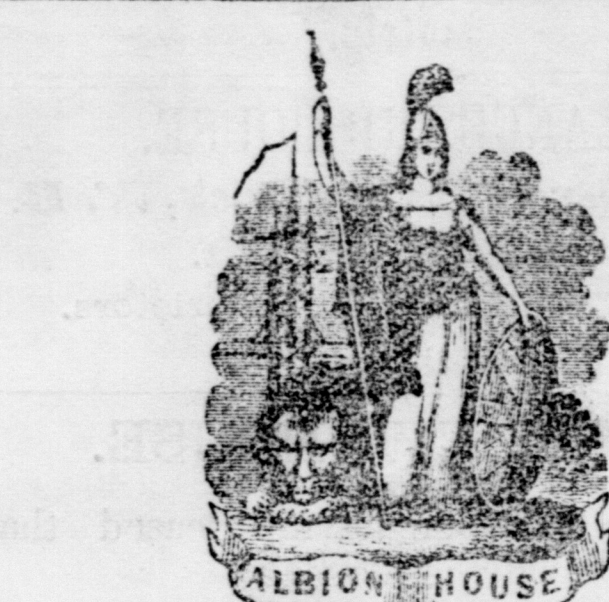
