

ITALY.—Majority of Chamber Deputies had unanimously resolved to continue the support of Ricasoli's Government.

GERMANY.—Violent shock earthquake at Dresden on 9th; it extended as far as Leipzig; no damage reported.

HOLLAND.—Ministers tendered their resignations.

RUSSIA.—Reported that Russia had sent an ultimatum to Rome, to the effect that if the Pope does not condemn the conduct of the Polish Clergy, Russia will recognize the Kingdom of Italy.

TURKEY.—Turks at Tripoli had maltreated several Christian inhabitants. French Consul demanded indemnity, and French frigate had arrived off that Port.

INDIA, CHINA, &c.—Additional telegrams received in anticipation of the arrival of these mails.

At Calcutta, December 15th, produce markets were active. Freight to England 72s. 6d.

After the coup d'etat at Peking, new Regency was established, the two Emperors, State of affairs was encouraging. Rebels were in vicinity of Shanghai; foreigners were prepared for attack. Ningpo also in state of alarm from same cause. Japan quiet.

LATEST VIA QUEENSTOWN, Jan. 12th.—The Journal St. Petersburg publishes article congratulating Mr. Seward on uprightness and intelligence of his policy, and demanding that "Trent" incident may become a starting point of negotiations for recognition by Powers of common principles upon question of neutral flag. The same article also expects England to give the world solemn guarantee for future by signing a Convention which by ensuring respect for rights of neutral Powers, would contribute to maintenance of Peace, and mark the progress of civilization.
