

cannot discuss views expressed in Austrian note as opposing those of Prussia. Prussia yields precedence to no Confederate in conscientious fulfillment of Federal duties in representation of real German interests, and serious endeavorers to justice to well founded National claims and to induce Federal Government to do the like, should view on Reform of Federal Constitution hinted at in latter part of Austrian note, favoring establishment of a Constitution for whole Confederacy, with efficient executive power at its head and aiming at political consolidation of wider extent, comprising non-German territories, as already stated in Austrian note of 8th November, be realized, Prussia would be compelled to see in such realization far greater peril to continuance of Confederacy, than in Reform indicated in Russian despatch of 20th December.

Prussia is far from opposing formal protest to mere expression of opinion, but at same time considers it more proper to wait proposal of reform in more concise shape. At present as far as Prussia can judge, proposed reforms are impracticable, proposals being entirely in contradiction with Prussian views.

Prussia on its part considers it impossible to enter into discussion on any such reforms.

Paris, 16th.—French papers think question of Mexico might lead to fall of Palmerston's Cabinet. It is believed England will withdraw from expedition should its aim be abandoned by Spain and France and should they interfere in internal policy of Mexico.
