A Bill to authorize the Municipality of the County of Carleton, to provide for the erection of a Lock-up-House in the Village of Florenceville in the Parish of Simonds, in the County of Carleton.

Whereas, by the reason of the distance of Florenceville from the Gaol in the shire Town of said county, and the risk, inconvenience, and expense of the removal of persons from there to the said Gaol it is deemed advisable and necessary that a Lock-up-House should be built in said Florenceville.

The Council of the Municipality for the said County of Carleton at any meeting of the Council of said Municipality, shall, and they are hereby authorized, directed and empowered, to contract for the erection of a Lock-up-House or House of Correction in the Village of Florenceville in the Parish of Simonds in the County of Carleton, and to arrange for such sum or sums of money as to them may seem meet to carry this object into effect; and the said Council of said Municipality, are hereby authorized, directed and empowered, to make a rate and assessment upon the inhabitants, or upon the said Parish of Simonds (as they may see fit) for a sum not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds, for defraying the expenses of the erection and finishing the said Lock-up-House, or House of Correction, and from time to time to make such rate and assessment for the maintenance of the said Lock-up-House or House of Correction, as to them, may seem meet.

It shall and may be lawful for the High Sheriff of the said County, or for any Constable or other officer having legal custody of any person or persons who shall or may be arrested in the said County of Carleton, in all cases in which the said Sheriff or other officer could legally lodge the said person or persons in the Common Gaol of the said County of Carleton, to commit the said person or persons to the said Lock-up-House or House of Correction, until the said person or persons can be removed to the said County Gaol; provided always, that no person under civil arrest shall be detained in such Lock-up-House or House of Correction for any space of time exceeding forty eight hours. The said sum of £150, so to be assessed, shall be levied, assessed, collected and paid agreeably to any act or acts in force for the levying, as assessing, collecting and levying of County Rates.
