UNION OF THE LOWER PROVINCES.—The Toronto Globe in an article on a union of the Colonies, in which is pointed out the political difficulties which will be the result of uniting Canada, politically, to the Lower Provinces, and in which the writer maintains that by such union Canada would gain nothing, but that New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, would be greatly benefited.
