Militia Battalion Order.
In terms of an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, passed 23rd April, intitled an Act relating to the Militia:—
CAPTAINS and Officers commanding Companies, and not being volunteers, in the First Battalion Carleton County Militia, are hereby required to assemble with their respective Companies for Drill and Exercise at the time and places following:—
Nos. 1, 2 & 3 Companies embraced in the Company Divisions between the lower line of the parish of Simonds and the Madunakik river, in the parish of Woodstock, will assemble at the COURT HOUSE, on MONDAY, the 5th October next at 9 o'clock, a. m.
Nos. 4 & 5 Companies in the Company Divisions, between the river Madunakik and Bel River, in the parish of Woodstock, will assemble at or near Mr. John D. Beardsley's, on TUESDAY, 6th October next, at 9 a. m.
No. 6 Company, all assembled at Mr. John Shea's, in the parish of Northampton, on WEDNESDAY, 7th October next, at 9 a. m.
No. 7 & 8 Companies in the parish of Richmond, will assemble at SOUTH CORNER, on Thursday, 8th October next, at 9 a. m.
All persons liable to perform Militia duty, of the age of 18 years and under 45, of the parishes of B and C, in said Battalion district, are required to assemble at the time and places above mentioned, in order to their being regularly attached.
In Command will be required to furnish the Adjutant with correct Muster Rolls previous to the Companies being dismissed, in order that a proper return may be transmitted to the Commander in Chief, and also that all assentees may be fined.
