

reputation of England will regard this open assistance to traffic in human flesh as a disgraceful stain on the English flag. There was rather less excitement in half-British on Friday, 20th, and after touching five half-British at day four half to three (four to one) the odds reached ten millions sterling and were expected to be fifteen to eighteen millions at close.

Times again asserts it is regarded as cotton transaction and not politics. And, after all, there is nothing in it to prevent any one from subscribing.

In House of Commons 19th, Mr. Layard in reply to inquiry said since breaking out of Civil War in America, communications between British Government and that of United States, in reference to Island San Juan, had been suspended.

Bill relating tobacco duties passed through Committee. On 20th Seymour Fitzgerald gave notice that he would on the 23rd ask whether Government had accepted or intended to accept proposal of Lincoln as to communications between England and United States to enquire into any just complaints of violation of neutral rights.

Mr. Baxter moved a resolution declaring it inexpedient to renew subsidy to Galway Railway, he strongly denounced Galway contract. General debate ensued. Palmerston denied it was a job, he said Government were actuated by a desire to promote prosperity of Ireland. Motion rejected—106 to 40.

Annual meeting of Atlantic Telegraph Company held in London 19th. Directors' report, of which an abstract was received per "Mora Scotian," was adopted. A statement of condition and prospects of the Company. Said as soon as \$200,000 was subscribed they intended to commence operations—three months' time was already taken. He had confidence that rest would be obtained, and as much more as would be necessary. American Honorary Directors were re-elected.

Poland.—Debate in French Senate on Polish question concluded on 19th. Billant on behalf of Government expressed sympathy of France with Poles, but said fresh insurance could only bring fresh misadventures, and it is neither good, useful nor humane to encourage it. French Government persists in this language; aspirations for liberty were manifesting themselves everywhere and Russia power more accessible to vain hopes than before.

A demonstration in favor of Poland has been raised in Paris. The Patrie of the 19th says, "To day conclusion of lecture delivered by Professor De Virardis a large number of students gathered for the purpose of protesting against the policy of the Government in Poland. On arriving at Place Odeon they were however dispersed by the police. During the sitting of Senate police surrounded Place Odeon and Rue de Valenciennes in order to prevent people collecting together. Some arrests were made in consequence of above demonstration."

Paris Moniteur and London Times regard news from Poland as a demonstration that insurrection is becoming general.

Intelligence from Lithuania states that all Marshals of Corporations in the provinces, all Judges and Judicial Officers, all independent public functionaries have sent in all their resignations on mass. These resignations are based upon a resolution not to receive any more titles from Government in Russian language. The functionaries who resigned are said to have declared infamous all who should consent to fill positions they vacate.

A telegram from Tarnow announces that Langiewicz defeated Russians under command of Gen. Schachowsky, and captured considerable quantities of war material. Reported the reply of Austria to French proposals is evasive.

Latest telegrams from Cracow say a report is current that Langiewicz has been put in charge of the Austrian troops. He was at Cracow, sought consent of Austrians to pass through Galicia but was refused. Earth works being thrown up around Warsaw; inhabitants expect attack at Easter.

FRANCE.—The Times Paris correspondent writes the news from Cochis Caine is by no means satisfactory, and reinforcements are earnestly asked for by commander French forces. General Forey is making the same demand from Mexico, where it is said six thousand men are required in addition to the present large force in that country. The coming elections cause much anxiety to Government.

ITALY.—Garibaldi's health causes renewed anxiety. London via "Quebec" 22nd.—Stock Exchange Saturday evening; 4 o'clock after official hours, were firm at 92 1/4. Confederate loan 3-4-4 1/4 premium.

A Cabinet Council was held on Saturday. Mr. Pender, M. P. for Manchester, joined the Division of the British American Exchange of Banking Corporation.

WOOD TRADE.—We learn from A. F. & D. Mackay's Timber Circular, bearing date 27th ult., that since last February, 10,137 tons of wood, registered, wood laden, have arrived at Liverpool from British North America, viz: 6 from St. John, N. B., and 4 from other parts; at the same date last year, 4 vessels, 8,839 tons had arrived. In reference to the state of the market, Messrs. Mackay remarks as follows:

Pine Timber.—Of this article there have not been almost any arrivals since the close of our annual circular, at which time the stock on hand was less than at the same period of the year previous, and sales have been confined as usual at this period of the year, to small lots and portions of cargoes, to suit the requirements of immediate consumption.

Red Pine.—The stock on hand, although large at the close of the year is not such as, considering the increased demand which it has recently met with consequent on the absence of Pitch Pine, to leave room for believing that any large quantity will remain undisposed of at the spring of the next import.

N. B. and N. S. and U. S. A. Pine and Spruce Deals.—The demand for these has been moderate, and at the last auction sale cargoes have been sold at prices ranging from £7 1/2 to £8 5/8 for spruce from St. John, N. B., and from Bangor, United States, America. Pine Deals, from St. John, are dull of sale, and can only be disposed of at low rates.

Birch.—Of this the import has been light, and good wood meets with a fair market.

Edmonton & Mitchell's Price Current of the 25th ult., gives the following quotations of prices in Glasgow:

White Pine—100 Logs St. John, 10 inch average, 104 1/2, per foot net weight, 371 Logs Quebec Broadwood, 13 inch average, brought 20d. per foot.

Birch.—130 Logs St. John brought 16d. to 16 1/2, and 63 Logs Quebec 18d. per foot.

Deals and Battens.—We have no auction sales in Glasgow to report. In Greenock, St. John Spruce average 10 1/2, and Pine 11 1/2, per cubic foot at auction.

A CUTLERY NECKLACE.—The Committee appointed by the Corporation of the City of London to decide upon the disposal of the amount voted by that body for the purchase of a gift in the shape of a necklace, have chosen a superb necklace of 32 fine and large brilliant, and a pair of top drop earrings to correspond. The necklace is of the value of £10,000, the sum voted by the Corporation, and derives additional interest from the fact that many of the diamonds were seen and admired by the Prince of Wales. The centre diamond is a large and fine brilliant, while the remainder of the stones graduate in size on each side of it till the circle is formed. The total weight of the stones is 171 carats.

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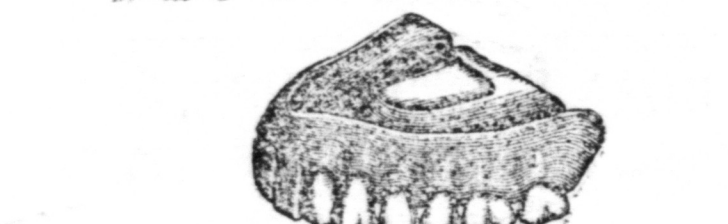
