Mechanic's Institute.

This building is being proceeded with rapidly we learn that, with a not very large additional outlay, the contractors could have the main hall ready for occupancy on the first of January-by the contract they have till the first of June next.

We are somewhat disappointed and disatisfied with the building in some of its details. We hope, if we state in what respect, there will be none so excessively thin skinned as to take offence, as was at some remarks some time ago respecting the foundation stone. The building is, including the main entrance, 72 x 48. The basement is divided into a school-room 22 x 40, and three small rooms suitable for committees, library, &c., each 22 x 40. The ceilings are 10 feet high-here is the first item of which we complain. This story should have been at least 14 tect high. Even in modern dwelling houses 12 feet is not considered any too bigh, and, certainly, in a modern school-house, with the light and knowledge which we possess, to make it with ill means of ventilation, lit only on one side, only 10 feet high, remembering that one of the largest, if not the largest, school in the County. the Gram mar School, is to occupy it, seems to show a want of proper consideration on the part of somebody.

The upper and main Hall will be, in the centre or sitting space, 53 x 47, 20 feet posts; its appearance on entering will be as broad as it is long, and, taking off the space for platform and entrance from below, in the rear end, it will be reduced to a length about the same as the width. We need not say that a square Hall is not a handsome one. Then again, there is no provision for any ante-rooms; this arrangement will not only be inconvenient but, for many of the purposes for which a public Hall used, will be a complete hinderance. The having an entrance at the rear beside the platform is a good one, but most decidedly that entrance should be into an ante-room, and not directly into the large Hall. There can be no necessity for finishing the building without the necessary conveniences of this sort, especially as there is plenty of land-nor need the Hall be cramped or curtailed in its dimensions. Nor is it too late still to make any necessary changes in the internal economy. We state our convictions now because we believe attention to these suggestions will prevent annoyance and loss in the future. Nor are we unmindful that, as a Director of the Institute, we must bear a portion of the blame, if blame attaches to any one, in connection with the building thus far.




