

emancipation meetings and those who take part in them. It says it will maintain its solemn protest against domestic massacres in garb of emancipation.

British men-of-war in commission have been reduced by ninety vessels and nearly thirteen thousand (13,000) men since August.

Important trial against Admiralty in which Mr. Clark sought to recover half million £. for inforcements on his patent in iron ship-building, resulted in verdict for the Crown.

Marriage contract of the Prince of Wales published. Princess is secured £10,000 stg., a year.

Professor Hughes has been exhibiting with great success the working of his telegraph instrument before leading men of Liverpool and Manchester over the wires of the United Kingdom Telegraph Company.

Great satisfaction was given and instruments were being brought practically into play on the wires of the above company, who had secured the exclusive right to their use in England.

Newspapers are eulogistic of the instruments which are yet in the hands of the Admiralty.

Merchants of Liverpool in Brazil trade held a meeting and adopted resolutions deprecating summary and extreme measures taken against Brazil and calling upon their members of Parliament to ask Government for information on the subject.

Paris letter gives report that Lincoln's administration demands from France categorical explanation of the Emperor's intentions towards Mexico, of interpretation to be put on his letter to Gen. Forey.

Poland.—Insurgents continue active. Reported Government at Warsaw began to stop conscription and an order declares all persons taking for conscription on the night of the 25th and 27th January are to be released.

An unsuccessful attempt to poison Marquis Wielopolski and family is reported.

Council of Empire at Warsaw received orders from the Emperor to propose several bills of administrative reform for Poland.

Process.—The King in reply to address from Chamber of Deputies excluded proceedings of Ministry and pronounced complaint of Chamber against administration to be unfounded. He asserted his determination to maintain the rights of the Crown and Upper House, but deplored the differences of opinion and hoped for reconciliation.

Latest.—Lyon report. 7th.—Poland.—Wongrow has been taken after sanguinary battle; insurgents were dispersed. Reported poisoning of Marquis Wielopolski and family confirmed. No one yet dead.

Spain.—It is asserted that France asked Spain to send back troops to Cochín. China's reply was that she will respect treaty she concluded with that country.
