Consumption is not a local disease of the lungs : but a disease of the whole system which shows itself and assumes a local expression in the lungs, hence, it is argued, present aspect of affairs, for they may rest assured Freeman. which deprave the blood, and waste vitality, and produce tuberculer diathesis in which originates consumption, and therefore the propriety of such sanitary regulations in our private dwellings as well as in our schools, prisons, &c., as shall ensure purity of air, and the avoidance of sucking into the innermost parts of our vital organs, the foulest secretions from each others skins and lungs. 
