

## LATER FROM ENGLAND.

**Arrival of the Canada.**  
HALIFAX, Jan. 25, 1864.  
The Canada left Liverpool at 9.30 on the morning of the 19th, and arrived here at 10.15 on the 25th; she has 4 Halifax and 31 Boston passengers.  
The Princess of Wales gave birth to a son at Frogmore on the 18th, all doing most favorably.  
Judgment would be given in the Alexandria case on the 11th of January.  
Frankfort Senate refused authorization to draw letters for Great Eastern steamer and demanded from Frankfort Consul at Liverpool the account of his connection with the scheme.  
Dr. Tuck, Bishop of Ely, died on the 17th.  
Parliament formally prorogued till 4th of February, then to meet for the despatch of business.  
The investigation into the conduct of the English in Galway Bay, concluded. The Court thought of blaming Capt. Prosser somewhat for running in at night. Had pleasure in returning his certificate.  
Four suspected conspirators were arrested in Paris. They had arrived from England. Three are Italian, named Tamburo, Greco, and Imperatori. The fourth an assumed name, evidently false. It is asserted that one made complete avowal of the criminal object of the conspiracy. At their residence were found a great quantity of gunpowder, four poignards, four revolvers, four incense burners, eight hand grenades of Ordinance, &c. &c. A letter dated Lugano, was found on one conspirator, very compromising to all concerned.  
Paris correspondent of the Times says insinuations were thrown out that the attitude of the opposition in the Legislature has something to do with the arrests, and that the authority of the Government would be less controlled were it known people were in the hands of the opposition.  
The trial of the four Italian takes place at the February Assizes. Nothing discovered to compromise others.  
Paris correspondent of the Times mentions a case of a large American order for Railway iron being given to a French house—French article being found of good and certainly cheaper than English.  
Hottelers' question—Matters continue threatening. King of Denmark visited the fortifications of Frederikshavn, 5th, passed through Flensburg 7th, for Sonderburg 8th, and Copenhagen 9th.  
It is asserted that England issued a fourth note to Federal Diet urging a conference.  
It is denied that Prussia had withdrawn from proposition for a joint occupation of Schleswig by Austrian and Prussian troops.  
Danish troops still occupied northern part of Rendsburg on the 17th.  
It is stated the Prince Augustenburg intends declaring Kiel a free port.  
London Times says that, with a view of assisting English diplomacy and for the protection of British interests, it is not unlikely the Channel Fleet just ordered home may soon show itself in German waters.  
It is owing to British consuls that the Danes abandoned important positions and sacrificed the greater part of the country which is the subject of dispute, but as there is great difference between sympathy and interference, England is bound to weigh well the consequences any act which would entail her in war; to the residence of the Government, therefore, the conduct of affairs must not be committed, and Parliament will doubtless sanction any Palmerston may take to preserve the honor and dignity of the nation.  
Times regards the commencement of the campaign in Schleswig almost certain within a brief space.  
Italy—Garibaldi's resignation of seat formally communicated to Italian Parliament on the 17th. Several members urged its non-acceptance, but it was finally accepted, together with resignation of other members of "left."  
The London Morning Advertiser states last authority that recent proclamation attributed to Garibaldi is a forgery, and Garibaldi disavows it.  
Largest via QUEBEC—Consols after official hours yesterday closed weak at 90½. Market very flat all round.  
The ten men charged with piracy and murder on board the Flouery Line were brought up and remanded.  
Stated that Federal forces in and upon borders of Holstein number thirty thousand, and would soon reach hundred thousand.  
Committee on Federal Diet made report decidedly adverse to Treaty of London.  
Paris 17th. The four Italian conspirators arrested came from Italy, not London.  
Indian Mail, from Bombay Dec. 14th and Calcutta Dec. 5th, forwarded per Canada.  
It is asserted that the dissatisfaction on the Punjab frontier is greatly exaggerated. It is a mere repetition of the trifling frontier war such as has been fought twenty times since the annexation of the Punjab. No later news of military operations.  
Newspaper G. H. Warren, of Boston, lost on the first passage to Liverpool. She ran ashore at Carnarvon Point, Ireland, and is full of water.  
Consols 91½. Flour still advancing. Wheat easier. Corn steady.
