EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE. St. John, Oct. 13, 1864. It is scarcely possible to divest oneself of the Ex-

hibition, for although we remained in Fredericton a sufficient time it was supposed to admit of everybody and everything getting quietly home, we found the Heather Bell on our passage down filled to repletion, not only with people who had been to Exhibition, but with horses and sheep and such like which had been to and on exhibition. And then it is a favorite topic of talk here, and also a favorite theme for the newspaper writers. We think, indeed, that many people in this city, have waked to a mortified sense of the position St. John occupied at the show, where her manufacturers and mechanics were not so largely represented as they might have been, or as they would have been had it been really supposed that the Exhibition building would be what it proved. THE ENGLISH REVENUE. - The Revenue returns to September 30th show an increase as compared with the same quarter last year, in spite of the considerand which, last quarter, occasioned a decrease of cheapness with utility and elegance. £216,000. There is still a decrease in the customs of £248,000, and in the property tax of £84,000. The taxes also show a decrease of £8000. There is 000, but the excise shows an increase of £430,000. The Post Office furnishes a remarkable increase of £140,000.
