

## The London Times says:—

The conference to be opened in London are on the basis of the integrity of the Danish monarchy; that is, the Powers entering into them recognize that the sovereignty of the Duchies belong to Christian IX., and the only question will relate to the connections between a part of his dominions and the other. To the principle of the conference, France and Russia have already assented, as the principle parties to this quarrel—the Governments of Austria and Prussia on the one side, and that of Denmark on the other. There is reason to hope that the Diet will not be so obstinate as to refuse the presence of an envoy. When these preliminaries are settled, the conference may be held in a reasonable hope of success; for nothing will remain for it but questions of administration, when once the principle of the kingdom's integrity has been recognized. Should defeat embitter the spirit of one of the armies now in Schleswig, and thus prolong the war, the victory of the conquerors will have been dearly bought.
