The distance by preliminary survey from Bell's on the Saint Andrews Railway to the crossing of the Maduxnakik near Davis' saw mill in Woodstock will not exceed eleven and one-tenth miles, and by location, it is believed, that it can be reduced to eleven miles. In this distance the only bridge required is at Bedell Brook, at about five jections have ever been raised to the doctrines and one-third miles from Bell's, in lieu of three advanced by him. bridges required by the former survey, two over Bull's Creek and one over Bedell Brook. this crossing the grade of the Railway will not exceed forty-seven feet above the bed of the stream, and by introducing 200 feet feet of wooden bridging or trestle work the quantity of earth work in the embankment will not exceed 40,000 cubic yards. The entire length of crossing, ineluding both bridge and embankment, from grade to grade can, it is thought, upon location be reduced to 800 feet; this being the most difficult point upon the route, it had been thought proper to introduce a grade of 60 fect per mile, extending about a mile in length. Possibly this may even be reduced upon final location, by finding lower ground on the southerly side of Bedell Brook and the Hodgdon road. From this point to within three and three-quarter miles of Woodstock, in the vicinity of H. E. Dibblee's place, both the grades and earth-work are moderate, there being considerable level grade. At this point the work for a short distance, say one-half mile, assumes a heavier character, but it would be considered by no means formidable, upon most of the railroads of the United States. With the two exceptions above named, the work will be remarkably light. In three-quarters of a mile from the Hodgdon road towards Woodstock the cuts and fills will not exceed six feet. From H. E. Dibblee's for about three miles the grade descends at the rate of one foot per 100 feet, or fifty-two and eight-tenth feet per mile. On the remaining three-quarters of a mile to the Maduxnakik crossing the grades will not exceed an average of twenty feet per mile. The remainder of the route to the Iron Works at Upper Woodstock is quite feasible, with moderate grades, the whole distance being less than thirteen and one third miles.

With the exception of the points at Bedel Brook and near H. E. Dibblee's there will be no necessity for a more than 3 ocurve, or 1910 feet radius, and at these points it may be necessary to introduce a 4 ° curve, or 1432 feet radius. Although the estimates have not been entered into in detail, yet the Surveyors are confident that the cost of construction per mile will not exceed that of either of the routes formerly sur-
