

## American News.

New York, June 16.  
The "City of Paris" with Liverpool dates to the 7th inst. arrived. It is fully confirmed that the proposed Conference of the European powers has been abandoned owing to the demands of Austria and Prussia, which were regarded by England, France and Russia as tantamount to a refusal. All negotiations have been broken off by the neutral powers, and it remains for the armed powers to negotiate among themselves or continue war. The London Times says, daily, almost hourly, the chances of peace pass away. It believes that the first events will occur in the Elbe Duchies, but that the great move of Austria will be to attempt to possess herself of Silesia. The Daily News says appearances indicate that a declaration of war of a magnitude equivalent to it will proceed from Prussia. The Prussian Government has issued a circular note to the neutral powers, charging Austria with a flagrant breach of the treaty by referring the Holstein question to the Diet. Prussia has also sent a protest to Austria declaring that the measures announced by Austria in the Diet violate the treaty of 1815, cause the suspension of the Duchies and restore the two powers to the position accorded by the treaty of Vienna. Military preparations are reported from all quarters. After another long debate on the Reform Bill, Mr. May's amendment was withdrawn, and the Bill was ultimately referred to the Committee without division. Breadstuffs, but firm; Provisions inactive; Consols 85½, a 86½; U. S. 5-20s 64½ a 64½; The Agra and Masterman's Shares have suspended. Liabilities heavy and widespread. The Directors do not doubt all will be paid in full, and only an inconsiderable amount of paid-up capital is lost. The event caused considerable commercial depression, although not unexpected. New York, June 16, p. m.  
The Herald's Brownsville, Texas, correspondent gives a view of Mexican affairs under Maximilian's rule, that shows that the empire is fast verging into anarchy.

Since the last report three deaths from cholera have occurred in this city; at quarantine there have been three deaths from cholera, leaving 45 under treatment. The board of health are making every effort to prevent the spread of the scourge. The Tribune's Montreal special says, Kelley, their correspondent, has been released. The Fenian prisoners, were under examination on Saturday. George Crawford, of St. Albans City, has been fully identified as the Fenian spy. Gold 162½.

New York, June 19.  
Toronto, C. W., 18th.—The Government has appointed a commission to take evidence and report upon all claims for compensation and damages arising from the Fenian raid on the eastern townships. Bills are being prepared to establish local constitution in Upper and Lower Canada, in view of Confederation.

Toronto, N. Y., June 18.  
An immense public meeting, in the open air, held here in favor of the repeal of the neutrality laws. Gold 154½.

New York, June 19, p. m.  
An Ottawa special says, the Cabinet Council has decided to use great caution in making arrests under the Habeas Corpus Suspension Act. A number already arrested have been bailed. One of the Fenians arrested has been recognized as a deserter from the 47th regulars. Commissioners are being appointed to assess damages done by the Fenians, with a view to their liquidation by the Government. It is a matter of consideration whether the claims shall be submitted to the United States. The subject of assimilating the Canadian tariff to that of the United States is under consideration. Montreal despatch says, 3000 men will be kept on the frontier, mostly regulars. Gold 150.

New York, June 20.  
Col. W. R. Roberts, President of the Fenian Brotherhood, was introduced on the floor of the Senate at Washington by Mr. Wilson on Monday, and to the crowd assembled at the sailors' and soldiers' Orphans' Fair in the evening, by Speaker Colfax; he addressed the crowd on the subject of Irish Liberty and Speaker Colfax also delivered a few remarks. Head Center Stevens was to have been introduced on the floor of Congress by invitation of Mr. Colfax, but understanding that similar honors were intended for Roberts he declined, as he thought it would look like a collision between himself and the Colonel to the people of Ireland. New York, June 21.  
The Panama Star says that when last seen the Spanish fleet was steering for the south-west, evidently bound for the Straits to Montevideo for supplies; two vessels had left the fleet probably for Manila, where the Spaniards have a large supply of munitions of war, and the entire fleet may come back again. The last steamer from Point Look Out had on board 180 Spanish subjects, who were compelled to leave the country. Gold 157½.

The Irish Reform Bill.—The Derry Standard says:—Carrikerbeg is to be left untouched, though Larne, with a population of 2,769, and Antrim, numbering 2,138 inhabitants, with the outlying villages of Whitehouse and Whiteabbey, might be advantageously incorporated with the "Parishes" of the old borough. So pre-eminent has Carrikerbeg made itself, even since the era of the first Reform Bill, that in one instance the issue of a Parliamentary writ was suspended, and ulterior proceedings were for a considerable time regarded as inevitable. Lisburn, too, is not to be disturbed, and the Parliamentary "blue book" reveals eleven centuries of memorable history.

The Northern Whig suggests that the rising town of Lurgan, whose inhabitants amounted in 1861 to 7,772, ought to be conjoined with Lisburn for Parliamentary purposes, and this is a matter which should be strongly pressed upon the attention of Government. The Boroughs of Armagh and Newry are also in a condition as unsatisfactory as can well be imagined, and the writer alluded to, proposes that Armagh, Monaghan, Clones, and Omagh should be amalgamated together, and that Newry, Banbridge, and Portadown should form an associated "district of burghs," as it would be called in Scotland.

The Fenian Prisoners.—There are probably at this moment nearly as many Fenian prisoners in America as in Ireland. The number captured by the United States steamer, Michigan, is said to be between 400 and 500, and there are at least 80 in the hands of our authorities, besides Murphy and his associates. What is to be done with those captured on Canadian soil, where they had come to rob and murder a peaceful and unoffending people, is a question that must soon be practically disposed of. Acting on a recent precedent, growing out of a demand of the American Government, the whole of the 400 or 500 prisoners in the hands of the American authorities would be liable to extradition and punishment in Canada.

The Irish judges have delivered their judgments on the legal question whether the conviction should stand in the case of a man found guilty and sentenced for bigamy, the second marriage having been illegally performed by a Roman Catholic clergyman, the prisoner being a Protestant, within twelve months of the marriage, which was therefore null and void. Could an indictment for bigamy be sustained under the circumstances? Mr. Justice Keogh has thought so when trying the case, and the conviction was upheld by Judges O'Hagan and Keogh, the Lord Chief Baron, and Chief Justice Monaghan, but as on the other side there were the Lord Chief Justice Lefroy, Baron Hughes, Fitzgerald, Casey, and Justice Christian, Fitzgerald, and O'Brien, the conviction was quashed. The Lord Chief Justice held that the word marriage, where it occurs secondly in the Act, must have the same interpretation as where it first occurs; he hoped, however, another prisoner would not escape under this interpretation, and that an "intervening Act" would provide for an offence so gross.

A terrible accident occurred at Medina on Thursday night. The house of Mary Ryan, a widow woman with five children, took fire, and she awoke to find the flames roaring around her. With incredible exertions, she succeeded in arousing four children, who slept in different rooms, and getting them safely out. Then, with a baby two years old in her arms, she ran back to get fifty dollars from a bureau drawer in her chamber. As she did so, the floor above fell in upon her, and herself and the babe were burned to death.

Mr. Grinnell, a member of Congress, was assaulted a few days ago by another member known as George Russell. The assault was committed after a disagreement. The cause of the outrage was some verbal skirmishes, in which the latter got the worsted. The delinquent will, it is expected, be brought before the bar of the House of Representatives and expelled.
