## A Suggestion.

There is no country probably in the world where better vegetables may be raised than on lands contiguous to the river St. John.

In looking over the returns of the Custom House, St. John, we find among our imports for the 1865 that we bought from the United States and sister Provinces of

Of a total for these articles of \$65,730. Now there seems to be no earthly reason why this amount of money should be sent out of the Province, or why the labor necessary to the production of these articles should not be expended within our own territory.

Of course the above is the invoice price which we may add fifty per cent which brings the amount up to \$98,595.

Of course a considerable portion of the above is for early vegetables, brought into St. John to supply the market before the gardens of the Province supply the demand.

Early vegetables pay well; the extra expenses incurred in raising them is more than over balanced by the superior prices they demand. Thus the potatoes at the amount given above average about \$1.19 per bushel, or double the price of that root at a later period of the season.

Confederation, considered in relation to the interests of the Empire, is undoubtedly a taking thing. Every thoughtful Briton, not less than British American, would naturally feel an interest in a subject which may be said to press for a solution equally on both sides of the Atlantic. No problem before British statesmen at the present time is more intricate and embarrassing than this one of British America's future. For the past ten or even twenty years the real making of Great Britain have plainly foreseen the present emergency, and have endeavored, through the press as well as by speeches in Parliament, to arouse the colonists to the responsibilities of their position, and impress them with the importance of improving their privileges. The colonists, unaccustomed to national responsibilities, have succeeded to move in the direction so plainly suggested, namely that of a separate national existence, entirely independent of the mother country. THE QUEBEC FIRE.—About 4 o'clock in the morning, Oct. 15, an alarm of fire was heard through the streets of Saint Roch and on proceeding to the locality it was found that a fire had broken out in a house of Mr. Trudel, grocer, St. Joseph street, three doors beyond Jacques Cartier market. Owing to the early hour there were few people about; the wind which had blown all night and continued to blow all night, had slightly abated; but still it raged with such fury as to cause most serious apprehensions, which unfortunately were afterwards too sadly realized. By the time the fire brigade reached the spot, Charles's house was enveloped in flames. The Sapeurs were already there, but there was no force of water in the hose and getting on a force of water; the delay, which was not remedied for nearly an hour, enabled the fire to burn rapidly. There were now some ten or a dozen houses on fire and a number of wooden sheds on all sides had ignited. By half past five more than eighty houses, all wooden, were in a blaze, and the flames, driven by the wind, spreading in all directions. At half-past six over a hundred and fifty houses were consumed. The fire by this time had run along St. Joseph and Notre Dame des Anges to the junction of St. Charles street, and had reached the corner of the toll-gate, and the streets surrounding the General Hospital and Convent. Another terrible fire was raging with even more fury, while the back of Crown street, along Prince Edward street, and the streets leading to the crossing Valier street, the fire spread into St. Saviour street, with its hundreds of wooden houses, the destructive element raging in default of better fire suppression, was doing its worst, and the fire crept back, doing its work of destruction. At 11 o'clock in the morning the whole centre of the district lying between the river and the river was a barren waste, with nothing but bare chimneys and smouldering embers. Having nothing to feed on, it distributed itself in opposite directions, and in the morning it was blowing in gusts from every direction, three separate conflagrations were observable at once. St. Saviour Church, Dunn's soap and candle factory, Ross' ropewalk, and other large buildings, were in flames, and the fire was spreading in all directions.
