The immediate facilities for manufacturing lumber on the Central lines could not be for a length of time, at all events, greatly increased; the lumber manufactured at the North finds its way to market either in timber and deals direct to England from northern ports, or in short lumber to the West Indies and South America. The North builds ships and freights those ships with the lumber from northern rivers, and therefore for the conveyance of that lumber the railroad would be practically useless. By the Frontier route, however, the thing is entirely different. It is difficult, if not impossible, to ascertain

precisely what the extent of the lumber trade of the upper St. John is, but in our estimates we shall be below rather than above the mark.
