NEGRO SUFFRAGE .- If general negro suffrage in to prevail the negroes will be in power in several States of the South, and will have such State offices as Governor, Judges, Secretaries, Treasurers, Commissioners of Canals or Rail Roads, Schools, Police, Trade and Benevolent Institutions. The dominant blacks will have their black preachers and teachers for churches and schools where both races may have to resort. The Militia officers and the police will be blacks. City officials will be blacks, and in counties there will be negro Justices of the Peace, Postmasters and Constables. We shall have in Congress several black Senators and forty Representatives. These, after the fashion of giving office and patronage here. will insist upon having their share of offices in the Departments, and in Custom Houses, and for Assessors and Collectors of Internal Revenue, for for appointments abroad.
