

oppose the payment of such bounties; but now the great West also declares against it, and it must be stopped. There is really no reason why we should pay a bounty for catching a fish any more than for a pumpkin or building a house. The talk about the fisheries being nurseries for seamen is absurd. During the recent war these Gloucester and Marblehead men enlisted, not as seamen, but as soldiers. Besides this, they make the very worst sort of sailors for our men-of-war. But even if all that is said of this seamen's nursery were true, there is just as much sense in paying bounties to our farmers and our manufacturers because they manage nurseries for soldiers. The thing simply amounts to this: the rest of the country is taxed for the benefit of a few New Englanders. Therefore it should be at once abolished, and the government should see to it that no outbreaks occur in consequence of this action, and that the Canadian fisheries are not invaded by the malcontents.—N. Y. Herald.

THE TREATY WITH CANADA.—The Reciprocity Treaty expired on Saturday. No legislative provision has yet been made on either side for the new state of affairs in which its abrupt abrogation finds us, and each is left to pursue such a course of action as its own views of interest shall dictate. From the day when the treaty now expired was first proposed, to the time of its formal adoption, and all through the opposition which it received while it was becoming established by actual operation, but the journal was not an open advocate and defender. True, we did not insist on its perfection as a piece of diplomatic legislation, for we were cognizant of existing faults and shortcomings on which its enemies dwelt to the exclusion of any other view; but we insisted that, as we do now, that it was better to gain even half our point than to refuse anything because we could not get all. It was an experiment, at best, for which the common interest demanded a fair trial; and if it could be shown, after such trial, that it required amendment and alteration, then the same might be effected, with the aid of the wiser views of the subject which experience would surely bring.

But to suddenly destroy the treaty, root and branch, whether in retaliation for Canada's alleged discrimination against the United States in the matter of carrying a wheat, or the grossly one-sided conduct of the Canadian authorities during the rebellion, looks like spitting venom more than the other party to the contract, when we might more surely gain the same ends by patience and reason. Violence is no part of true statesmanship, and it is not to be confounded with firmness and resolution. Wise men do not take their measures when they are in a pet or passion, but with deliberation and after duly surveying the grounds. It is enough to say for the treaty that, under its operation, our trade with the Province has increased in a surprising degree, and promised a continuance in the same direction. We were not in the least exporting our produce and our manufactured goods over the same streams and through the same canals. The vexed fishery question had been settled amicably, and the nation had hoped settled forever. Trade was becoming brisk between us, and the interests all combined to draw us into closer relations continually. Canada was laid gravitating to this country from natural causes, which grew more and more powerful as the old obstructions were removed. And anxious for the prospect of the day ahead, when the two peoples would become one politically, as they were last becoming united, socially and commercially. That consummation would have stood out into clearer relief, and the events of the century for the Continent.

It is all over now, however. We are only left to express the hope that some happy combination of circumstances may avert the threatened difficulties of the future, and that the independence of the Province as a distinct Confederacy, may not prove as powerful an obstruction to our commercial interests in other countries as the operation of an amended treaty would have been a gain.—Boston Post.
