

HORRIBLE AFFAIR.—On the second instant Fortune Wright, a colored man belonging to the 9th regiment, was executed at New Orleans for murder. When the drop fell there was a fall of over six feet, but the man had been properly prepared, the knot failed to slip, so that when the body rebounded the knot twisted around to his forehead. Wright thus hung suspended by the loop passing around his forehead and under the very prominent developments of the head behind the ears—hung by the head instead of the neck. The shock was sufficient to render him insensible. After hanging a few moments a copious perspiration started out from his forehead and under the arms, and even his breathing became regular and natural. The surgeon having examined him and declared that he could not die from the effects of such hanging, the body was lowered, taken from the rope and carried up a second time to the drop. The knot was retied and the rope placed about his neck, the body propped up and the rope again cut. The rope remained under the chin, strangling the before unconscious man.

The mystery which surrounds the movements of Head Centre Stephens hardly be said to be removed by the statement now made by a Cork paper, to the effect that the notorious Fenian leader made his escape this week from Ireland, and is now on his way to America, whether it is said, his wife intends immediately to follow him. It is reported that, before leaving, Stephens enjoyed upon the members of the Brotherhood in Ireland to attend more to their peaceful pursuits than they have been doing for some time. If these are really the parting words of the Head Centre, it may be said that nothing in Ireland became him so much as his manner of leaving it. Numerous further arrests of Fenian soldiers and Irish Americans have been made in Dublin, and numbers have also been arrested in the provinces. The rumored escape from the country of Stephens is not confirmed, but his wife sailed from Cork for America on Thursday. The soldiers found guilty of Fenianism in Enniskillen have been sentenced to be hanged—a comparatively mild punishment, considering the capital nature of their offense.
