Last year he had stated, as he did just now, that Councillors should look after illegal sellers of liquor. It was not a part of the duty of Councillors to do so. But Mr. Leary is a Magistrate and he should, as he is bound by law, look after these things. He, Mr. K., had not been in the habit of making highfaulutin bunkum speeches on temperance or any other subject. It might suit Mr. Leary to do so as he was looking to another place, but he, Mr. K., thought he should make a better use of his talents and be more truthful and display less ignorance. If not a single man took out license he, Mr. K., was not responsible. It was all very vell to try and smooth the matter over and blarney people into believing his statements, but when circuses and similar entertainmens come to town they are charged heavy license fees, but if riots result the parties become a County charge.
And if stores are broken open, or any depredations committed within the Town, the Courty has to pay the expenses attending the imprison-ment and trial of the parties. He asked simple justice, and there was not a half dozen intelligent men but would endorse his views. Mr. Leary should now be willing to do justice to the

Mr. Dibblee thought it scarcely probable that exceptional Legislation would be passed to deprive the Town of Woodstock of rights gueran-teed to it of the same nature and in the same manner as other incorporations, such as St. John and Fredericton. An attempt would be met with derision by the Legislature, who, to carry out Mr. Kilburn's views, would have to go back and revive all past Legislation on the subject. The shire Town is outside of the corporation and the expenses referred to have to be borne equal-

ly by Town and County.

Mr. Kilburn was perfectly willing if the Town would take care of its own thieves and robbers, that it should keep the revenues mentioned. Mr. Clowse thought action had better be post-

poned to give time to ascertain it the law relating to Woodstock was the same as in the case of St. John and Fredericton, and to see what proportion of the annual expenses of the whole County they bear.
Mr. Lloyd had long thought that Woodstock bore too small a part of the County expenses, considering the large proportion of the revenue she obtained. He did not think the County should clothe and feed all the law breakers of Woodstock. If there was no law to effect it he

thought in honor the Town should pay the County a bonus of \$10,000. There were mighty crimes committed in that consecrated spot begirt with railroad iron, and he thought as he always had, that there was a great deal of injustice perpetrated upon the County. Mr. Leary was sorry to hear mistatements made, and so strong a feeling of antipathy exhibited toward the Town. One would think to hear the statements made that Woodstock paid nothing, while she paid more than her just proportion. Whatever benefits the Town benefits

the County; her property was its property, and these feelings of jealousy were unwise and hurtful. Had the people of the Town ever refused to give and give liberally, to assist in the erection of school houses, and churches, or to relieve any distresses occurring to individuals from accidental calamity? They had never refused, but in every Parish there was to be found evidences of their liberality, and he must repel the charge against the Town.
