

> INFORMATION FOR THE PEOPLE.-We understand that the Globe states correctly the principal points of the law recently enacted, relative 1823. Generals Guerrero Bravo and Negrete to the Inspection of Burning Oils, when it says: "The Act passed in June last providing for the inspection of Petroleum and Coal Oils, and burning fluids, requires Importers and holders of such Oils and fluids on and after the first day of August to cause the same to be inspected, and imposes a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or six month imprisonment on those who neglect so to do. The Act further requires under the same penalties for any violation of its provisions that on and after the first of September no person whomsoever shall sell any oil or fluid for burning purposes that will not bear the test of 110 Farenheit, without giving off vapor that will fire or explode in the presence of a lighted match. All burning oils and fluids that do not bear this test are to be marked "unsafe for illuminating purposes," and will not be permitted to be sold except for remanufacture or exportation .-Whether offered for sale by retail or wholesale the penalties are the same. Thus all parties having stocks of oil or fluid not of the required standard, will seek to get rid of them before the first September next."
