On the whole, the grain harvest of middle Germany was below the average; that of the southern State yield of corn is considerably smaller than in the last two years; the same is true of Roumanis The Russian harvest is stated to have been good and the crops have nowhere failed so completel as in some places last year. The fodder is every. where poor, with the exception of a few mountainous districts.
