CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT. Ottawa, 16th May, 1869.

It having been represented in this Department that in violation of the law large quantities of American silver coinc are brought into Canada without entry or payment of duty. I have to call your attention to the subject and to enjoin upon you increased vigilance in the discharge of your duty and that of your officers along the frontier in the prevention of smuggling, and you are specially to enquire of travellers and others whether they have in their possession, either on their person or in baggage, any American silver, and you or your officers are to seize or report any such silver which may be attempted to smuggle, taking particular care that, in the discharge of this duty, you discriminate between a clear design to defraud the revenue and an unintentional breach of the law. in which latter case no seizure should be made, but the officer should see that the silver is duly entered and duty paid.
