Oitawa, March 10. Yesterday a Bill introduced by Mr. Mills, local Legislatures should regulate the matter .-A six months postponement was moved by Mr.

Harrison, seconded by Mr. Gray, which carried, 82-69. The vote on a similar motion on the same bill was 82-57. So that the principle is gaining friends somewhat in the house. The New Brunswick members, those who were present, except Messrs. Tilley, Gray and Costigan, voted against the postponment and, consequently, in favor of the bill.

A debate occurred on an address for correspondence respecting depredations committed by American fishermen in Canadian waters. Mr. Robitaille complained that outrages had been committed in the Bay Chaleur, and no

protection whatever afforded. He blamed the government for this. Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald explained that the duty of the Canadienne was to protect fishermen. But the Canadian government had no

power to give orders to Imperial vessels. Hon. Sir A. T. Galt urged great caution, and deprecated a discussion without the correspondence, holding that our policy must accord with that of the Imperial government.
