THE FISHERIES QUESTION .- The present state of the dispute over the fisheries makes a draft on statesmanlike qualities which we fear will not be readily supplied. The actual seizure of American vessels is raising an excitement dangerous to all calm consideration of the question, and making it continually more difficult to return to the methods of reason in composing international disputes. There are really two positions for us to choose between; first, to insist that the abrogration of the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854 restored the treaty of 1818; or, second, that the war of 1812-14 did not affect the right of free fishing which was conceded in the third article of the treaty of 1783. The latter position is the broader one for us, and our advantage would be the greater if we could succeed it establishing ourselves upon it. The former invokes a concession once made to Great Britain, through the prolific source of controversy until the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854 was negotiated; and it is opposed by Great Britain no less strenuously than the other, her Government denying
