HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL
IN COUNCIL.

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Act 31, Vic. Chap. 6, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," His Excellency in Council has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations respecting the coasting trade of the Dominion, in amendment of the regulation adopted by Order in Council of 24th July, 1868, shall be and the same are hereby adopted and established:
1st. It having been enacted by Chap. 9 Sec. 22, 23rd Victoria, that the Governor may grant yearly Coasting Licenses to British Vessels navigating the inland waters of Canada above Montreal, although such vessels may sometimes make voyages to Foreign Ports, it is hereby ordered that the holder of such License shall not be employed in the Foreign Trade, but that it shall be confined to such trade, that when ever any vessel or boat is employed in a voyage to or from a Foreign Port, the master or other proper officer thereof, shall report inwards and outwards, in all respects, as though he had not received such Coasting License.
2nd. Representations having been made of serious inconvenience to the Master and owners of Steam Vessels employed as regular passenger and freight packets, between the port of St. John in the Province of New Brunswick, and the ports of Digby, Annapolis and Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia, and also to the Mercantile community of the said Ports, in consequence of such Steam Vessels being obliged to report their cargoes each trip in detail, it is hereby further ordered, that the Collector of Customs at the Port of St. John, may grant any such Steam Vessel, a yearly coasting license, subject to the same conditions as are provided in the case of vessels trading between ports in the same Province, with the additional condition that the Master or other Officer of such Steam Vessel, shall be furnished with two cargo books to be used during alternate months, and that at the end of each month, he shall surrender the book used during that month to the Collector of the Port of St. John, and said Collector shall return to him the other book with which he had been furnished, so that the record of the trade of each month, shall be in the Custom house, to be used for statistical purposes during the whole of the succeeding month.
