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Items Foreign & Local.
A Minnesota wood-chopper hewed down a tall tree the other day, and upon splitting up the trunk with an axe and wedge, found imbedded in the wood at the point where the trunk diverged into branches, a leather bridle of antique pattern, with a bit and buckles attached, and all in a remarkable state of preservation. It has been fully thirty feet from the ground, and its presence there can only be accounted for by the supposition that some passing horseman had used the crooked sapling as a rest for his bridle, and led from the place in pursuit of his straying horse had been unable to find it again, and abandoned the bridle to be carried up and entombed by the slow growth of the tree. It is believed that the tree must have been fifty years in concealing its treasure.

The Court of Common Pleas, Ireland, has decided that Capt. French, is entitled to the seat in Parliament of which Capt. Nolan was deprived by Judge Keogh in consequence of undue influence having been used to secure his return. Three judges of the Bench held that the acts committed by the clergy and other agents of Nolan disqualified him as a candidate, and that the votes given for him were of no more account than if given for a dead man. The Chief Justice agreed that Nolan was disqualified, but dissented from the decision on the ground that the majority of electors did not know that their votes for Nolan were worthless.

We observe that a house in Boston addressed a large invoice just received of Japanese paper clothing, which it said, can be washed five or six times, and that the paper collar manufacturers held an annual meeting in Boston last Friday, at which a statement was made up to the effect that the number of collars and cuffs of paper to the number of 150,000 were made annually by parties represented in the Paper Collar Protective Association, while they use over 30,000 yards of cotton cloth per diem for goods partly cotton and partly paper. The business was said to be increasing rapidly.

The cost of the recent strikes in New York is being estimated. It appears from an official statement published from the record of the Department of Buildings in 1872 that the cost of the falling off in building in 1872 as compared with 1871, is \$2,327,000. It is fair to estimate that at least one half this sum would have been paid to workmen as wages if the strikes had not occurred. In other words, the building mechanics have saved the city over \$1,163,500. Meanwhile the city suffers from the suspension of building improvements, and the loss is one which is felt by every taxpayer. It is not too much to say that the strikers have lost the popular sympathy.

Queen Victoria has ordered a handsome tomb to be erected over the grave of the late Inspector Baker, of the royal household, who died in the Tower of London, in 1869. It is another instance, if one were wanted, of the invariable kindness and thoughtfulness with which the Queen of England treats those connected with her household.

It is rumored that a Tribune, of England, is about to contribute to one of the English magazines a series of articles on certain customs in the British Army.

Bull Doggie, the driver of Goldsmith's mail, has published a challenge to the Goldsmith's Mail against the Boston Herald and Joe Elliott, best three in five with weights up, subject to all miles, for from \$5,000 to \$20,000. The challenge takes place at Prospect Park, or any Massachusetts, Pennsylvania or New York course, and the challenge will be open for one week.

A Baltimore minister has been deposed just now for playing whist and under a pitch for the drinks in a large bar saloon. Strange how little charity some people have.

A number of ladies in Grenville, Alabama, have signed the following pledge: "We, the undersigned, do promise hereby that we will faithfully abstain from the use of tobacco in any shape, form or manner, while in church."

A sugar refining company, with \$500,000 capital is being formed in Illinois.

In the recent coronation of the new King of Abyssinia, 300,000 people were feasted for two days. About 20,000 cows were killed and 40,000 gallons of honey were drunk.

A Vermont, who sent for one of the \$2.50 sewing machines advertised in the paper, received a shoemaker's saw, worth about ten cents.

Alabama hires out its convicts to work on the railroads. Each has an iron spike held by a chain which reaches up to the waist. The convicts are kept in a room running on wheels and trip and fall whenever making the experiment. The contractors feed, clothe, and guard the convicts and pay the State 40 cents a day for each man, and every day, for every month they faithfully work on the road a thick smoke, and as it was accompanied by vivid flashes of lightning and deafening thunder, people ran to their feet, their faces blanched with terror and their hair stood on end. The alarm was a false one; and in a few moments, instead of fire, the rain came pouring on the building, and the auditorium looked like a great mass of water. The people, notwithstanding their fright, remained to the close and then departed amid cheers and wild enthusiasm. The fable of Orpheus is a fable no longer.

Ring, St. John, improvement in machines for distilling salt water; J. S. Armstrong, St. John, improvement in screw and screw driver; Muscovite, St. John, improvement in car couplers; J. M. Taylor, Fredericton, a new method of securing a Star Spangled Banner with such wonderful harmony and power that the rushing sounds paused in their headlong flight, listened, applauded, and ceased to move on.

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Three men were recently hoisted 100 feet in an elevator in Jackson County, Ill., when the machine broke. One man in the descent struck a wire stretched across and was completely cut in two.

Two butchers of Royalton, a small village near Cleveland, Ohio, having a grudge against a farmer named Schaefer, went to his house, and finding no one home but his grandchild, a little girl nine years old, they seized the child, poured oil on her clothes and set her on fire. She was burned so badly that she died in a few hours. Before her death she told the names of the fiends.

General News.
SACVILLE INSTITUTIONS TO BE RE-OPENED.—We learn that matters connected with the Sacville Institutions lately occupied in the attention of the Methodist Conference of Eastern British America, which closed its session in Halifax a few days ago. The withdrawal of the New Brunswick & Nova Scotia Branch of the Institutions this year had brought them into a difficult position, and threatened to cripple their operations. The Conference, it appears, deliberated upon the case long and carefully, and came to the conclusion that the emergency which had arisen would have to be dealt with in a vigorous manner. Without a dissentient voice, it is said, the Conference decided that it was in duty bound to do its utmost to maintain the Institution in question in a thoroughly efficient manner.

We gather
