AN AMUSING POLICE DEVELOP-
MENT.
For some time past an individual named
O. L. Lee has been sending out circulars of
various kinds, and has been doing so with
such success, that he has been able to
procure a publication of an im-
moral character. In fact, the prospectus is
so ingenious, and so well calculated to
excite curiosity, that it has been a
momentary success, and has been
violated of the law, and had to be
withdrewn. From time to time
these circulars have been sent to
Major Jones or Chief Savage. Among
those received by the former official was one
from Frederickton, in which was a
notice which the goodly State of Massachu-
setts was made the subject of some rather
biting sarcasms, the writer assuming that it
was a disgraceful and a reflection on the
morality of the State to permit so gross a
violation of decency as he supposed this to
be. Naturally the Major was somewhat nettled

which the astute Lee had received his inven-
tion of 25 cents. The error was corrected
and an entirely new complexion to the circular,
as it was evident that every assertion it made
was strictly true, although the purchasers

visited Lee, expecting to meet Lee at the
Post Office, but he was not there. They
saw Mrs. Lee take the mail. Following her
they went directly to her house, when they

infringing no law; but on the contrary was
sending the Divine words to points where it,
in no other manner arrived. He was how-
ever convinced of the error, and he
at last consented to give up the contemptible
traffic. In ingenuity and barefaced effrontery
this swindle certainly exceeded the famous
swindle called—Baker's Corn.

THE TELEGRAPH AS AN ERRAND
The New York Evening Post says: Electricity
is to be reduced from its proud position as a
messenger between the continents to the
humble uses of domestic life. It is to be
made an errand boy, and to be called upon
to do the work of a messenger. A company has
been formed which proposes to establish offices at
convenient places in various parts of the city of Brooklyn,
and to send messengers to any house within the
respective districts. These offices are to be
connected by telegraph wires with the houses
of such persons as pay a certain amount
monthly (\$2.00) for the use of the service. The
